



If you cannot make the meeting and have suggestions, please contact one of the club officers to let them know. Thank you and hope to see you there.






April Garage Meet

And you'll also learn about something simple you probably should inspect on your Model 'A's in the future.

Jim's technical tip

Installing the Starter "Bendix Drive"

The small Bendix Drive gear that's bolted to the starter motor puts up with a lot of use (and abuse when you forget to retard the spark before starting). Eventually you will be working on yours and I have a tip for you about installing it back on the starter shaft.

The Bendix is bolted to the shaft with 2 special bolts and lock washers, as shown in the photo below. One bolt has a specially-shaped end that goes down into a hole in the starter shaft. This is critical, to lock the Bendix to the shaft; do not substitute a plain bolt for this.



The other bolt is "special" only because it is only 11/16" long. This allows the bolt to lock the spring in place, without having the bolt actually touch the starter shaft. Don't be tempted to use a 3/4" long bolt instead of the correct shorter one. See the comparison photo of a 3/4" bolt and the correct bolt.



When this longer bolt is used, it presses against the starter shaft when tight and it messes up the Bendix operation.

Don't forget to install the half-moon shaped Woodruff key in the shaft before slipping the drive on the shaft. You may also use 2 spring clips (optional). Be sure to lock the bolts down tight by bending the ear of the special lock washer up against the bolt head. If you don't, these bolts will work loose and fly out of the starter drive.

I carry a spare Bendix spring (they are known to break) and a set of these special bolts and lock washers with me in my parts kit on tours. If I don't need them, someone traveling with us might. This will help quickly get them back on the road to Have a Model A Day! 





Air Filter Flow Model "A" zenith Carburetor - By Dave Renner

Three air filters were tested using an Air Maze 90 degree elbow on a Model "A" Zenith carburetor. These tests were run on a Super Flow Flowbench SF-120. The reading accuracy was +/~ 0.25 CFM.


The Air Maze woven wire filter and paper filter are commonly used. The K&N filter was chosen for test because it had the same 0.D. as the Air Maze, and the length when installed provided a good fit in the vehicle without other modifications.

All filters were 3.25" O.D.. The Air Maze original woven wire filter element and it's replacement paper filter element had 3" exposed lengths. The K&N filter (E-2040) had an exposed length of 6". See photo 1 (wire filter shown) and photo 2.

As shown on the graphs, air flows with the filters installed improved at throttle openings greater than 50%. Little difference was seen in the type of filter used. What made the biggest difference was the 90 elbow and its orientation on the "A" Zenith carburetor. Rotating the elbow on the air horn had negative effects on flow. An important note to remember is that the Model "A" Zenith is not a pressure balanced carburetor. It was not designed to have anything installed over the air intake. Any restriction in flow creates a lower pressure in the float bowl resulting in an airfuel ratio change. If a filter is to be used the carburetor must be pressure balanced. This requires machining an air path between the air intake (choke area) and the float chamber. See Secrets Magazine vol 18 no. 4 April 2009 page 24.










(2) Air Maze converted to a KN filter.

A Little History of the Easter Bonnet/Hat

For many people, getting a new outfit for Easter has been a longstanding tradition. Their new outfit is not complete without a dress or suit and tie, shoes, and an Easter bonnet. The Easter bonnet has been a timeless part of this holiday for the past decades. It was even popularized in the Irving Berlin song "Easter Parade." But, do you know the history behind this Easter headpiece?

The Easter bonnet actually originated as a European tradition. People would wear new clothes and hats to celebrate the coming of spring and meaning of Easter. Spring and Easter signal new life and rebirth. Getting a new outfit and hat was one way to honor that meaning. The first bonnets were circles of leaves and flowers to show the cycle of the seasons. It was also a time when many people attended church a few days in a row for Easter, and a time to see who was wearing the latest fashions.

It wasn't until after the Civil War that the tradition caught on in the United States. The first Easter after the war ended was known as the "Sunday of Joy." Mothers, wives, and daughters came out of mourning and replaced their dark clothing with outfits full of pastel colors and spring flowers, to again signal a renewal of life. In the 1870s, the first Easter Parade in New York City occurred. The Easter bonnet was brought into American pop culture by the Berlin song in 1933. However, the parade and bonnets didn't peak in popularity until the 1940s. Over one million people participated in the tradition in 1947. These days the New York parade is a much smaller affair with about 30,000 showing up each year to flaunt their hats, but flaunt their hats they definitely do! From the Forsyth Family Magazine

the right idea all along. He didn't buy a new cat for 33 years because he didn't happen to need one. He and his 1929 Model A Ford did just fine by each other.






Mr. Gillis is 78, a Justice of the Peace, ond not given to hasty decisions.
